Beach Restoration by John Mannarino, Director

The Rudee Inlet Dredging (Croatan Beach Nourishment) Project is out to bid. The bid due date is Monday, June 8, 2020. Below is the link to the bid solicitation page:

The anticipated schedule, based on the solicitation bid date, is approximated as this is a USACE (US Army Corps of Engineers) project.

The possible nourishment schedule may proceed as follows all things being equal:

- 1. Bids received on June 8, 2020
- 2. Contract awarded by mid-July 2020
- 3. Dredging contractor begins dredging and beach nourishment efforts by early August 2020

4. Completion of dredging and beach nourishment efforts by late September 2020.

Note: the above timeline is an approximation. The actual schedule will be based on if bids are favorable, how quickly the contract is awarded, and when the contractor will be able to begin.

Funds for the Croatan Beach Restoration were NOT impacted by the revised FY21 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget and remain available.

Public Works Coastal Engineering Section and Public Works Beach Operations are continuing to monitor the condition of Croatan Beach. The current/optimal plan is to nourish the beach berm first under the USACE Rudee Inlet dredging contract. Once the beach berm is nourished, Sand Trap sand will be used to nourish the dune system. The dune system restoration will be conducted by Public Works Beach Operations. Dune grass planting of the entire dune system will occur in winter 2021.

Safety, Security Update, Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC), and Virginia Beach Council of Civic Organizations (VBCCO)

Security:

On Sunday evening, May 31, what began as a peaceful

demonstration on the Oceanfront to raise awareness of concern over the deaths of George Floyd and other people of color at the hands of police or vigilantes, was hijacked by an unruly few and turned destructive. Pent-up rage, job loss, and angst incident to two-months of COVID-19 isolation may have added to the desire to lash out indiscriminately. Fires were set; one man was shot. Many of you may have listened, as I did, to police radio traffic establishing a line of defense at the south end of the Rudee bridge – too close to home.

The Virginia Beach Police Department is professional and competent; but they are understaffed. They were "all in" well past 2:00 AM Monday morning ensuring that peace was restored. Please join me in thanking them for their dedication to keeping us safe.

Please practice these common sense security measures:

- Remove any firearms from vehicles.
- Keep doors, windows, and vehicles locked.
- Keep exterior lights on during periods of darkness.
- · If you have video cameras, be sure they are operating properly.
- · If you are out and about maintain situational awareness to avoid mass gatherings and/or protests.

Police non-emergency number is 757-385-5000. In an emergency, call 9-1-1.

Safety:

The good news is that the beach has been opened, albeit with social distancing practices still in effect. A simple way to enhance social distancing is to move laterally from the beach entrance upon arrival so that subsequent beach goers are not forced to pass close by. The City has posted signs at all entrances that address group size and various activity restrictions. We also have new street signs at each beach access path.

The opening of beaches affords us the opportunity to address common beach hazards and discuss safety procedures.

- Do not enter the water alone unless you are a good swimmer and someone knows when/where you're going in. Swim with a companion the "Buddy System" is the best system.
- Children should be kept close at hand and in-sight, especially when in or near the water. They can be knocked over easily by surf and disappear from sight in an instant.

- Do not dive into waves especially if surfing. The sand bars shift on a daily basis. Each year bathers at Croatan Beach suffer serious neck/spinal injuries by forgetting this simple safety rule. Paralysis and deaths have resulted.
- Beware of undertow and rip currents. Croatan is on the Atlantic Ocean. If you are pulled out to sea and find yourself in a rip current don't panic or try to swim against the current. Swim parallel to the shore until you are out of the current then return to safety.
- For your own safety, respect surfer/swimmer zones and be mindful of fishermen.

Lifeguards are present to protect swimmers. They should not be relied upon to monitor social distancing, dogs, or littering. We have to be self-policing on all of those issues. I do not know how long "Ambassadors" will be with us, but I expect we'll see fewer as the season progresses.

Now that we're in the summer season, dogs must be off the beach by 10:00 AM daily – whether loose or leashed. They're allowed back on the beach after 6:00 PM. Guide dogs enjoy an exemption from the time restrictions, but must be leashed. Please clean up after them – it is the law.

On the subject of time restrictions – bear in mind that all regulated on-street parking is allowed only between 9:30 AM - 7:00 PM. Numerous warnings and some tickets were issued in May.

The parking lot gate attendant told me that the lot will remain open until 8:00 PM during the "season." The City starts charging entry fees at 10:00 AM - \$3 for VB residents; \$7 for out-of-towners.

Rarely a week goes by when a pair of glasses or set of keys isn't lost and found in the sand. Most are reported on "Nextdoor," so having that "app" on your cell phone makes sense.

The Atlantic Hurricane Season began June 1 and we have already experienced two named storms (a third is forming as I write this). Know your evacuation zone (Croatan has all four zones) and prepare emergency kits ahead of need. Visit the City's emergency preparedness site at https://www.vbgov.com/residents/emergency-

Wildlife in Croatan by Susanna Miller (Suditi)

Birdwatching... With Your Ears!

There are moments that change the way you see the world. One of those times for me was when I took over a project for my Masters work in wildlife ecology at the University of Florida. The project required bird identification season by season in large area plots in pine forests. I spent months learning birds by call and song, as well as sight. Breeding birds, wintering birds, migrating birds, juvenile birds, courting birds, fighting birds... it was a jungle out there!

What I left that project with was the lifetime gift of being able to birdwatch without looking! There are so many beautiful, winged personalities out there and many are not that visible. Learning the song and calls of a bird can allow you a bigger picture of the avian world around you. If you are the active sort, you can add the thrill of the chase to identification by tracking the source through the trees or vegetation (don't trespass, though!).

I am going to suggest you check out a few of the commonly heard, but less often seen birds of Croatan... The Audubon Society has an awesome bird identification system that gives several recordings of calls and songs for each species.

You may be surprised to recognize some of your feathered friends' songs once you hear them.

Great Crested Flycatcher

The Great Crested Flycatcher is a raucously, noisy bird that tells me for sure every year that the migrants are here to breed. While not a small bird, it tends to be high in the treetops foraging for flying insects and advertising its territory. This cavity nesting bird is known for placing a shed snakeskin in its nesting material.





<u>Pine Warbler</u>

The Pine Warbler has a flat trill (song) and bright cheep (call) often heard from the canopy of tall pine trees. It is a small bird with a bright yellow belly and olive back in breeding season and readily seen white wing bars. This warbler will occasionally visit bird feeders.



Belted Kingfisher

The Belted Kingfisher is a handsome crested blue bird that feeds on small fish, snakes and frogs. In this species, the female is the brighter sex with a rusty red band added across her breast. This bird is also unusual for nesting in a burrow rather than a tree. The rattling call is most unique.

A few more Croatan bird songs worth checking out: Eastern Blue Bird, Gray Catbird, Pileated Woodpecker, Eastern Screech Owl.




