Wildlife in Croatan by Susanna H. Miller (Suditi)

With the sort of weather we have had lately, it seems a good time to recognize the waterfowl of Croatan. These waterfowl include just a few of the diving and dabbling ducks, but by no means all of the numerous waterfowl species that visit and live here.

This month I thought I would share some of the photos I have taken over the years... all from my backyard. I will include the common names, a quick line, maybe, and a link (go to the Croatan Civic League online version for active links), but will leave you to explore their biology online if you wish.



Northern Shovelers have an amazingly long and broad bill. Right before the lake iced over one winter, they swam in tight circles as though to prevent the ice from forming as long as possible.

Ring necked ducks are cute little diving ducks seen in the winter months. Neat fact from my link... The oldest known Ring-necked Duck was a male, and at least 20 years, 5 months old. He was banded in 1964 in Louisiana and was shot in 1983, in Minnesota. If you wonder why some ducks stay a certain distance away, you will often find it just beyond shotgun range.
