I have been blessed to have seen this magnificent bird throughout my childhood and adult life. As a child playing in the forest and as a wildlife biologist. I them saw occasionally in the day, but more frequently, I heard them night. As at with most nocturnal species, it is easier to hear than to see most of them.


Habitat

Remarkably adaptable. Wide variety of environments from deep forests, desert cliffs, and woodlots to suburban estates and parks.

Diet

Amazingly varied, but with a preference for rabbits, rats and mice. They are one of the few predators of skunks.

Characteristics



Heaviest and most powerful American owl. This owl knows no fear, if and sufficiently provoked will attack anything in its way. In its domain, only the Golden Eagle competes for the title of top avian predator. Hated by crows, who will "mob" Great Horned Owls on sight. Nests in old nests

of hawks, herons, eagles or crows, ledges in cliffs and large cavities in trees. Shows aggression by bill snapping or loud hissing. Has a variety of other calls in a variety of arrangements...
